Question 14

Pleased to see this included as an Issue. Agree with need to re examine/update need assessments and consider criteria for suitable sites, but you also need to be agreeing suitable broad locations for sites in Medway if site allocations are not proposed. There is no evidence to support that windfall applications will suffice. The need generally in Kent is still too great and immediate. The need is modest in Medway but as with other aspects of housing in this district there is pressure from in migration due to the Gt London effect. Need assessments in Kent have tended to ignore this yet it has clearly accounted for increased need for more pitches especially amongst Irish Travellers relocating from Gt London. I have seen little/ no evidence that in migration is balanced by out migration. There is no where for families to go. They can not return to Gt London. Please do not make the same mistakes as Swale Council when it comes to interpreting who has GT status, failing to deliver proper pitches, failing to address the need identified and failing to monitor/ make proper provision. You need to insist that authorities such as Swale and Maidstone make full and proper provision. It is essential that a reasonable choice of sites if provided in terms of tenure, location, size but pressure is greatest for small private sites and not large sites with privately rented pitches which offer no security of tenure and are often associated with poor quality of amenity/life. The GT population in Medway is small. Speak to them. Do not assume to know what they want (as Swale have done). Do not assume (as Swale have done) they will want to live on single pitches on urban extensions isolated from the rest of their community and surrounded by a settled community who are hostile to and resent their presence just because they are different. If planned as part of urban extensions ensure provision is made for a few families so that they can live as part of an extended family/community within the settled community. Unless you think you know what is intended in annex 1 PPTS as amended, insist on further guidance from DCLG on the meaning of the revised definition of GTs, what exactly is meant by Travelling, what is meant by a 'nomadic habit of life' before revising need estimates. Question how this change fits with the requirement at 13 (d) PPTS and explain how you intend to accommodate those who are ethnically GTs, culturally GTs yet are no longer recognised as GTs because they have settled in accordance with previous national guidance and are now too old or infirm to travel, or are single parents, having caring responsibilities and need to be settled. There is a need to explain to GTs the implications of the change to national guidance and establish their intentions given the new emphasis on a nomadic habit of life which Governments have been keen to suppress since 2006. Do not do what Swale have done and think that you can rely on previous travelling patternsuntil August 2015 GTs were effectively encouraged to settle and stop travelling long distance for work. Many equate 'travelling' with a return to a nomadic way of life and have misunderstood GTAA questions about travelling not realising that 'trips' away from a settled base for 1-2 weeks is still considered 'travelling'. Many may have to readjust their lifestyle in order to remain living in caravans, on sites, with their own community but lpas will have to facilitate this nomadic habit of life. Given the change in definition there will be a need for all authorities to provide transit sites to facilitate the nomadic

habit of life now required by Government. Unless and until this is provided no GT should forfeit GT status because they no longer travel, as the absence of transit sites and blockage of stopping places has effectively prevented many from pursuing a nomadic habit of life. Criteria need to be realistic, understandable and achievable. Most importantly, please don't do nothing. You have a small need. You can address this in Medway with out the need for costly site allocation plans. Work with your GT community not against them. Grant what you can. Don't be blinkered to the real need but do check that occupancy conditions are being complied with and enforce against those who are abusing GT privileges, filling sites with persons of questionable status (check your housing benefit records and where housing are sending all their homeless families) and harming the rights of genuine GTs. Good luck.

This is essential to the wellbeing of Medway as ONE community as well as the sub-communities in Medway. When an area is redeveloped, it brings with it hope that things can change, that things can get better, that someone (ie the Council) cares about where they live. It engenders pride in where we live and encourages us to come together more and maybe even contribute! This is in complete opposition to the alternative which is a downward spiral, which in turn brings with it all of societies blights - alcohol addiction, drug addiction, gambling (please - no more betting shops!!!) and so on.

Question 10

This is difficult. Medway's greenspaces are as important as the provision of homes. Without places to breath, so relax or walk we would become a concrete jungle. However, there seems to be a lot of land in Strood alongside the river where factories used to be... Also, continued development from the docks through the riverfront at Gillingham has opportunities.

Question 11

To create a plan and a vision, then when developments are proposed, only permit them if it fits with the plan and vision. Otherwise, the vision is eroded and things start to go wrong as greedy developers create nothing but housing with no heart for community etc.

Question 12

Question 13

My concern over student housing is that there is not a sense of a student community in Medway, despite the exisitence of 3 universities! Many towns/cities have very clear and vibrant student communities (ie Canterbury, Nottingham etc). Medway seems to be more about day students and so does not attract those from further afield who would contribute more to the economy and even settle in the area. More student accomodation which enables them to live the uni life would be my best guess.

Question 15

The redevelopment of run-down existing sites should be considered first. This has the double benefit of providing the required economic areas and redeveloping the run down ones. I enjoy wildlife a great deal and am sad to hear of the erosion of habitat at Lodge Hill - Nightingales cannot be relocated or 'new' areas created for them as they would not get the message...! However, once all other possibilities have been considered, people come first.

Question 16

I have always thought that there are opportunities around the maritime business. The creation of marinas, shops, fish restaurants etc would lift the profile of the area and could create job opportunities. This would locate around Rochester/Strood and Chatham. Rochester seems to be doing well with its High Street and with the Dickens brand. Chatham town centre is pretty grim and the shops reflect this. Newer shops, decent shops, less £ shops would mean people stayed in Medway rather than go to Bluewater or Maidstone (Fremlin Walk is a great example of a turnaround). Gillingham almost seems to be a lost cause and the shops in Rainham also seem to struggle.

Yes, we need to employ more people and enable them to stand on their own.

Question 18

This is back to the bigger vision of making Medway an attractive place to live and work. A big problem I experience in Medway is the transport within. It costs a fortune to get a bus anywhere and it seems very difficult to go from one town to another. Everything seems to involve a change at Chatham bus station. We should be able to get about more easily and cheaply, then we might not think it is just as easy (and cheap) to drive to Bluewater/Maidstone. There seems to be so much potential in this area and it could be a major force in the SE of England. We really do have everything, a river, cinemas, nuclear submarines, ice skating, ski slope etc, etc. But how to we attract people to this place? What is the tourist board doing? Do we have an identity as a city (which is what we really are in all but name)?

Question 19

If someone is studying engineering in Medway (not sure if this is an option), then what jobs can we offer them afterwards? We have thousands of teachers, but all our PGCE students have to go to Canterbury to get qualified. Many then stay in that direction or

just look elsewhere...

Question 20

Firstly, what jobs are people traveling out to do? Do we offer them in Medway? There is some work which will alway require out-commuting, but can this be balanced with some in-commuting?

Question 21

Yes. We should make it as easy as possible for businesses to do what they do, offer reduced rates etc. The income to the council should always be on the basis that it will be spent on making people's lives better.

Question 22

B&Bs for short term visitors which are close to the key attractions. Some decent hotels, accompanied by the required transport connections. Rochester would appear to have the best hope for this.

Question 23

By creating a true identity which people will come back to, holiday in etc. For example, the SW coastline around Dorset has identified itself as the Jurassic Coast and dinosaurs only play a small part in the attractiveness of the area. But it has an identity and this comes with buy in from the community. We need to be about more than day trips or one off events (Sweeps etc). Festivals like Dickens really have a stronger attraction for more than day-trippers. We have a river with so many opportunities for development, docks which would become watersports centres etc. We even have the climbing wall at Arethusa (there are not many climbing walls in the SE).

Question 24

To me this is huge. We could have marinas with people docking their boats to visit the restaurants etc. However, the wildlife is amazing in Medway. The estuary is home to millions of birds of hundreds of species. KWT sites like Darland Banks are home to some very rare insects (like the Straw Belle moth and others). A more organised approach from our country parks and ranger services would benefit tourism (again, I think of the amazing Durlston Country Park in Dorset) which has a great team of very knowledgeable rangers and is used by tourists and locals alike for watching wildlife, walking, exploring, climbing, housing art exhibitions to celebrate local artists, stargazing evenings etc. This draws in tourist who are staying nearby and provides opportunites for local people. I once offered to run a moth trap at Riverside CP to then have a 'meet a moth' event the next day and was turned down by the staff as I didn't have £400k of public liability insurance!

I can very confidently say that there may also be a strong market for students and young adults in full-time education, as they are often young and fit enough to take part without too much effort, but lack in finances so are unable to do so. I was one of those students, but fortunately I was close enough to college that walking was still an option.

Question 1

In order to achieve the Plan's stated aim for Medway to be an economically successful, attractive and vibrant place where people want to be, it is essential that existing employment opportunities are safeguarded and that new opportunities are provided. In heritage and village areas ensure this kind of building is in keeping with existing structures OR any changes are made in consultation with local people (admittedly not all of Medway's architecture is worth keeping). Be cautious of creating infill housing and road link-ups with Gravesend and Dartford, as this would effectively create a corridor from London to Medway and seriously erode the local character of the place. 2a). Housing sensitivity and sustainability: Consider longer term housing needs for those in need now, as well as the future. New development currently seems to be focussed on flats, which is highly inflexible housing. If your family changes you have to move house, you can't extend or expand. There are also quality of living issues with flats including lack of open spaces, noise and air pollution, generally small spaces and waste issues. There are inventive and creative solutions to housing which don't have to include flats. Self-building should be considered and encouraged as this dramatically increases people's investment in the area, so they are more likely to stay. Open spaces and access to parks, woods and riverside areas for recreation are vital in urban Medway for exercise and wellbeing. All new builds need to have access to green areas. I realise building regulations are set by national government, but use what authority you have to give preference to sustainable developers that will commit to building well insulated houses, that are larger than hutchsized and that are actually pleasant places to live. If they think about what people want from a house, a road, a community and try to give it to them, then people will stay and
hopefully take care of their new community. All new developments need a health centre, a nursery, a shop (with a PO), a pub and a decent bus service! 2b) Transport sensitivity and sustainability: Medway is a car-heavy area and many areas (both old and new) don't have enough parking. Even newer developments such as the chalk-pit estate off Cuxton Road in Strood doesn't have anywhere near enough parking for the number of houses there. Busses, run by Arriva, are very expensive and passenger numbers seem to be fairly low (in comparison to Canterbury for example). There are very few bike lanes in Medway, but cycling is the new golf, to capitalise on the opportunity to get people out of their cars by making roads safer for cyclists. Your report says that Medway has net outmigration for work, so if it is an aim to reduce this by increasing jobs in the area, then there will be more local journeys, so getting people out of their cars is possible and important. I think Medway train services are good, if expensive. The HS1 route has improved links to London, which has had the effect of making Medway a convenient commuter area for London, which has in turn pushed rental and house prices up. This is bad news for people who live and work in Medway and don't earn London money. This disparity of incomes (due to excellent transport links) need to be considered when planning which types of industries you want to encourage growth for in Medway - they will need to pay well if locals are to keep pace with commuters. 3. The Universities at Medway are a fantastic addition to the area, and seem to have altered the demographics of Chatham and Gillingham for the better (younger, brighter, more diverse). Students also offer the potential for keeping good minds in Medway, so I would suggest focussing on attracting areas of industry to Medway that the Medway campuses serve educationally. E.g. Greenwich Uni runs its engineering courses from Medway so consider attracting industry specific employers to the area, offering jobs to graduates and getting them to put down roots here. 4. Medway's education system is below standard, with children constantly slipping through the cracks. Part of the problem, I have been told, is that Medway fails to attract good teachers, so I think quality teacher and leader recruitment must be a priority. I have also been told that children whose first language is not English play a part in skewing the statistics for literacy levels, so I think it is vital that every school gets dedicated ESL support as this seems unlikely to change in the near future. Perhaps a dedicated ESL team for each school could also play a community role in teaching parents whose first language is not English, thereby integrating parents with the school community and ensuring first generation immigrant children don't play the 'translator' role for parents who remain unintegrated (as so many Indian and Pakistani kids did when I was at school in Chatham). Immigrants, in my opinion, are a benefit to our community and we have a role to play in providing safe and happy environments for their kids to live and grow up in, and ensuring their skills can help Medway grow stronger. Medway Hospital has many problems of its own, which I am not qualified to comment on. However I have never been a fan of huge centralised hospitals and think that as Medway grows devolving routine care/ minor operations back into the community with better, more local health centres, and more investment in community care for the elderly keeping them out of hospital, is essential. 5. This is a bit left-field, but I think that considering Kent is supposed to be 'the basket of England' and we all clearly have a waste problem that is exacerbated by tonnes of food packaging, why not encourage farm shops and pop-up markets with local produce in place of or alongside local branches of supermarkets? Promoting local healthy eating for the sometimes nutritionally impoverished people of Medway can't be a bad thing either.

Housing

Question 4

Yes, I agree with a majority of the points. I particularly agree that an increase of private landlords is altering the housing market drastically. Whilst I understand the need for private rental I believe it needs to be monitored with the same standar

Question 5

I don't understand this question. What is a 'housing market area'?

Question 6

I don't think we need 'affordable housing', whatever that means, I think we need council houses! I am nearly 30, have been married for two years, and have been saving for 3 years whilst renting privately and I can't afford the 'affordable houses' in a new development near where I grew up in Chatham. Both myself and my husband earn (not a lot but we both work full time) and we want to have a family soon, and neither of us want to live in a poky flat in Luton or Strood. 'Affordable housing' isn't real. Either you can afford a house, or you can't. If you can afford to rent, you can't afford to save. If you can't afford private rent you definitely will never own a house, and you shouldn't spend your life at the mercy of private rental, so people need social housing. The Conservative policy of 'right to buy' is anathema to me - it's a smart way of selling off Britain's housing stock and I know lots of people who are abusing the hell out of it. Social housing should stay as social housing. If I ever have my own house it will probably be because I've built it. Building is flexible and cheaper and avoids me having to live in a box someone sold me as an 'affordable house'. In English we have a distinction between 'house' and 'home' that many languages don't have. Most people want a home not a house, and although that's not linked to size it certainly is linked to security.

Question 7

Better home help and payment for carers. I've seen two close family friends go into old people's homes (both excellent homes) and I would fight tooth and nail to make sure my parents don't go there - they are places of degeneration and death. Keeping peop

Question 8

I think that keeping people as healthy as possible for as long as possible means keeping them with the people they love, so disabled people and ill people should, if possible be able to live with or close to their families. So adapting houses is a good option, or ensuring that any purpose built housing is integrated with normal housing so families can live nearby if they wish.

Question 9

Oh, it IS Medway's health and wellbeing! And it's been ignored for many years, hence why Medway hasn't always been a healthy place to live and be. You don't have to read much architectural theory to realise that good town planning and spatially aware development has a vast impact on how people feel about the spaces they live in, how they interact with their spaces and communities (how they treat it) and their quality of health. I think that the biggest contribution good planning can make to Medway right now is in high quality public spaces (both urban and green) and enhancement of our heritage - basically a bit of pride in the place. Good quality housing for all will benefit the health of the poorest and lower the impact of poverty on society. For the future, public spaces are where communities are built and where people interact and they have been very neglected in Medway. I mean where is the centre of Strood or Chatham or Gillingham? There is no clear public space at the centre for these towns particularly, and I think they suffer for that.

Question 11

I would like to see more emphasis on lower footprint developments (i.e. building houses with integrated solar panels, grey water systems and green roofs etc.), with off-road parking (perhaps basement car parks or in flood-risk areas ground floor car ports and houses above), some access to the outside (gardens, balconies etc.). Recycling needs to be made as compulsory as possible, with education central to convincing people that it's needed and worthwhile (watching bin men chuck all your carefully sorted recycling into the same chute doesn't help). As I said before, I think that trains are already good, and busses are too expensive considering how inconvenient they are. Busses are however necessary, and need to link up with the main routes into and around Medway. Cycle lanes and safe (i.e. wide enough) roads should be included.

Question 12

The desirability of self-build integrated with larger developments is questionable because I can't imagine a self builder wanting a) a plot as small as the average developer's plot b) wanting to risk being surrounded by high rises. Setting aside land

Question 13

It's high and will get higher. Students (particularly undergraduates) are a noisy uncouth bunch and will cause grief in local communities if you try to integrate them. They are best corralled off in student digs around shops so they can make as much noise as they want and no one will be disturbed. I personally think that Chatham high street and the Pentagon Centre are perfect sites for student housing. Right next to the bus stop too. A decent night club or two would be great in Medway too. Right now you have to go to Rochester or Maidstone. Disclaimer: I am a long-term student, and a lecturer. I was a noisy uncouth person at 18/19. I turned out alright. And I don't know why this box is in bold...

Question 14

I know absolutely nothing about this. If people want to travel around that's great. I know they are often associated with crime waves too, although I don't know how much of that is scapegoating. I think that dedicated sites should have a decent water and electricity supply, and that's about all I guess, if you have a caravan...

Housing Comments

Don't cut corners. Make sustainability (environmental and community as well as financial) the cornerstone of any plans. Be sensitive to the extreme poverty of parts of Medway and make sure education and jobs can keep up with housing, or it will all be for nothing.

Economy

Question 15

Any/ all waterfront development along the Hoo peninsular must take into account damage and impact on wildlife and wetland there, as there could be serious ecological impacts which although inconvenient for growth are vitally important to the overall wellbeing of the place. So maximising current brownfield sites where possible is best.

Question 16

Education, specialist engineering, science development (particularly energy, materials and 'physical' engineering - we should focus on industries that can employ graduates and also train apprentices). Creative industries including film making - I've heard talk of a film studio at the Dockyard, which is great. Utilise our fantastic industrial architecture in new ways (why not a decent theatre/ concert space too?). Business growth depends a lot on image, where Medway suffers - I think education at all levels is the only way to change this, as its the only way to attract employers who know they will get good quality local employees. Encouraging apprenticeships and trades on an equal footing with academic study is vital to maintaining a skilled (whilst not wholly academic) workforce. My husband is re-training through MidKent College at the moment, and I have to say I'm shocked at how poor the quality of education is there, the apparent indifference of students and the very high turnover of staff (apparently partly due to lack of necessary skills, and poor discipline among students). Improving education and wellbeing of our children and young people in all areas (core skills are necessary, but we need artists, dancers, linguists, and practical skilled people too!) is of paramount importance.

Question 17

I'm surprised at how much land is apparently needed for warehousing, but I know very little about industry.

Question 18

Promote Medway as an affordable and desirable area to locate businesses and creative industries, but resist turning Medway into a borough of London - maintaining local distinction is important for sense of place and local pride. The new Thames crossing provides both an opportunity for business but also could potentially exacerbate the

blending of Medway into an industrial/ tarmac corridor from London to Kent. Medway residents stand to lose as much as they would gain from this and it could well increase out-migration for work, which it seems a part of this plan to reduce.

Question 19

Invite big graduate employers in specific subject areas to the area. Do what you need to to get those graduates to stay after university.

That depends on many things. I think a duel approach to education/ training and promotion of Medway as a place for engineering and creative arts (they are simply two areas I have picked on - I'm sure you have access to research which would allow ident

The river has a fantastic heritage, and a seriously enthusiastic population of boat owners, and tug enthusiasts etc. There is an opportunity to better educate the people of Medway about the role the river has played in British history, but the river itself is neglected. Over industrialised, filled with litter, inaccessible for most of it's length. There will be a conflict between the industrial need for river access and the suitability of its use as a tourist attraction. Perhaps cleaning it up would be a start, both rubbish and water quality, and encouraging the local groups that already use it for pleasure (I know a few tug enthusiasts). If the river is made the centre of an attractive recreation area for locals, then tourists will follow (as they do in Canterbury with the Stour). But this means gardens and trees, not warehouses and wharves. However, unless you'd consider serious litter problem, generally Medway's river and countryside is filthy and polluted. I'm very sceptical of Medway as a tourist destination - it's barely a popular place with its residents. Why would anyone visit a place that people struggle to live in? Work on that first.

Question 1

I believe that there should be focus on both maintaining local communities to keep the heritage of Medway from being erroded, and rejuvenation of the large urban areas. From my point of view as a resident of Halling, my focus is much more on the rural economy as my Greengrocery business is based at Court Farm in Upper Halling. My immediate concerns centre around local people being unable to afford to stay in Halling due to pressures on the housing market. I am soon to move to Snodland as I cannot afford to rent or buy in the village, mainly because I am self employed and deemed too much of a risk in the current climate. In Halling more large scale housing like St Andrews Park is not an option due to our position sandwiched between the river and the downs, so providing jobs within the local community is key to increasing the communities incomes. The main worry I have is that the demographic of the population will force focus onto the older population and their concerns, rather than providing a framework to assist the working generations. We do have an aging population to care for, so it is imperative to provide strong economic growth, even on our rural scale, so we can afford the bills as they inevitably rise. I would hope that there is a suitable level of focus on future generations needs, in balance with those of the older population.

They support diverse wildlife, but they also have considerable historical interest, as much of the prosperity of Medway and the Lower Medway Valley arises from cement manufacture from chalk. In the past many of these quarries both large and small have disappeared to housing and industrial development and waste infilling. There are now fewer disused quarries remaining and what was a common resource is now scarce. We consider that disused chalk workings should be acknowledged as a key feature of the Medway landscape and furthermore given priority for conservation and informal recreation provision in the future. Dear Sir / Madam, Medway Council Local Plan Issues and Options Consultation 4th Jan 2016 till 5pm on 29th February 2016. The document outlines some issues and gives a simple narrative about possible future change for Medway. With little in-depth analysis, it is difficult to identify or assess realistic options for alternative patterns of growth. The Draft Plan, at preferred options, could present an integrated strategy and make clear choices about the balance of employment, housing and perhaps the role/balance of uses in different town centres with supporting policies . The Council might be taking a substantial leap from this I&O document to the Draft Plan. Vision and Strategic Objectives. The consultation material does not set out the Vision or Strategic Objectives for shaping future change for Medway in any detail. This usually forms part of an I&O stage. It is important to consider strategic objectives as they form the Local Plan 'place shaping' agenda. Obtaining the public's response, would benefit the Council to identify concerns and learn from informed criticism early in the plan making process. Here are links to Issues and Options documents at Wyre 2015 and Chelmsford 2015. There are probably others. They do not contain supporting Policies at this stage. http://wyre.gov.uk/downloads/file/2915/wyre_local_plan_issues_and_options_2015 http://www.chelmsford.gov.uk/issues-options Duty To Co-operate. Para 6.9 of Medway's I&O document states that The Duty to cooperate has been built into the process of preparing a new Local Plan for Medway. What would be helpful is a list of strategic cross boundary matters, including the LTC, and a full examination of all relevant issues and how important they are for Medway including what outcomes the Council is seeking to achieve through the DtC. GTAA. Gypsy and Traveller accommodation needs identify 22 extra pitches by 2028. It is disappointing that there are no options or alternatives for pitch provision. Flexibility should be built into this provision to allow for a review of need regarding the changes to the definition of Gypsy and Travellers. Chatham It would be useful, early in the plan making process, to assess how successful the previous policies in the Local Plan have been in terms of Chatham's sustainable development. Also how has planned/unplanned development along the river affected Chatham's current and future vitality/viability? **SEA/SA** There appears to be no up-to-date SA/SEA scoping report which is probably needed at this time. For the next stage, a draft plan will set out preferred development options and rejecting others, supported by policies. It would be difficult to understand how these general discussions in the I&O document could become a preferred integrated strategy with Policies. An intermediate stage that examines, in equal detail, different strategic patterns of development expressed as spatial options and with relevant evidence might at some point benefit the Council. Patterns of Development and Transport. The patterns of development are: High-density town centre and riverside development; Incremental suburban development; Significant planned growth of existing settlements; Freestanding settlements; Urban Extensions; Custom and self-build; Options for enhancing Chatham town centre. Without a full discussion and credible evidence to support or reject these patterns of development it is challenging to see how they can be assessed. Possibly a combination of all of them or some of them could be the most sustainable but this document does not explore this. As a result there are no

considerations of different transport needs for the different patterns of development. Future Transport needs are critical for Medway yet the document is silent on what transport infrastructure is required to support Medway's growth over the plan period. Lodge Hill SSSI Strategic Allocation. With the Public Enquiry postponed, the Council makes clear at para 27.7 that it is promoting the Development Strategy that removes the SSSI at Lodge Hill. Whether or not the Government confirms this development the Council may wish to anticipate the uncertainties and significant delays for the Local Plan. Whilst this is barely recognised, it might be beneficial to examine contingencies for the development allocations at Lodge Hills. Conclusion. With Medway's reliance on Lodge Hill, would it have been better to wait for the outcome of the public enquiry? At that point the I&O document could contain a Vision, Strategic Objectives and infrastructure requirements worked up into realistic alternative options. Then, after equal examination and consultation a preferred one chosen and others rejected. Regrettably, with so much missing from this document, to leap to a Draft Plan maybe a little hasty. The process could benefit from an additional I&O consultation, before a Draft Plan, with supporting policies, is produced. Then the Council might wish to take the opportunity to gather useful evidence and learn from informed criticism. Perhaps the Council is considering doing this but it is not clear from the documentation. Please add me to the data base for all future consultations. The University for the Creative Arts (UCA) supports the need for the new Local Plan to identify student housing needs over the plan period. UCA offers 215 bedrooms to first year students. Up to 500 second and third year students live in private rented accommodation in the Chatham and Rochester area. Students are directed to Studentenant and to student housing letting agents to assist with finding accommodation. There is therefore a high demand for this type of accommodation, however the choice is limited and the quality of accommodation is varied. Sites for new student and private rented accommodation need to be appropriately identified to ensure that they are in close proximity to the Campus and are served by reliable and frequent public transport services. There may be opportunities for Medway Council to look at joint private student housing estates, similar to those created in Canterbury, with Universities at Medway students. However, as UCA and the Universities at Medway Campus are located in different parts of the District any proposals or sites will need to be correctly identified so that they are in close proximity to both Campus' and are served by reliable and frequent public transport. UCA welcomes the opportunity to discuss the points raised with you further and to consider how the Local Plan could respond.

Compulsory purchase orders on empty properties near schools and colleges by the council, to be sold to investors at market value would encourage new student accommodations to be established and generated revenue for the council.

With the transit links of the A2/M2 Medway gets a lot of travellers. Part of the current issues people have with them is that they hijack any available land and are hard to move on. Establishing a couple of small sites to permanently be used by travellers would be good, provided they were operated by council staff and had security measures in place to prevent additional vehicles being brought on site - ie only pedestrian access outside of the hours that a member of staff was operating a barrier. Only registered vehicles allowed through etc.

Moving away from the outdated concept of 'high-street shopping' and establishing shopping centres where existing transit options are good would be wise. Tourist focussed high-street areas such as in Rochester have seen a boom in boutique shops, but otherwise it is only chain stores and franchises that can afford the rent. In other areas there are too many empty shops and dingy little pop up shops - mobile phone shops, '1 quid' shops, and betting shops. Consider sites such as Rochester airport and the adjacent business park, medway city estate, and chatham maritime.
