Elective Home Education



Introduction

This guidance is to help parents who are considering or are already educating their child at home, rather than at school. The education of a child at home is a significant responsibility for a family, it demands a serious commitment of time, patience and energy. We hope that this information will make clear the current legislation and it should be read together with <u>Medway Council's Elective Home Education</u> <u>policy.</u> The questions and answers section in this document should assist you to reach the best decision for your child.

Do children have to go to school?

No. Education is compulsory but not necessarily by attendance at school. The 1996 Education Act states; **'it is the duty of parents to secure an appropriate full-time education for their children'**. Most parents carry out this duty by sending their child to school, but you might decide to take on the responsibility to educate your child yourself, by opting for *'elective home education.'*

At what age is it compulsory for children to receive full time education?

The law requires all children to be educated from the start of the school term following their fifth birthday. However, most children will start school when they are four years old. The age when children may leave school is the last Friday in June of the school year in which they reach 16. Between 16 and 18, children may leave school but only to continue through to the age of 18 in one of the following:

- work-based learning (e.g., as an apprentice or on a traineeship program).
- full-time education (at school or a college).
- part-time education or accredited training (spending at least 20 hours per week working or volunteering).
- full-time employment.

Do I need to be a teacher?

No. You do not need any formal qualifications to educate your child at home.

What are the parents' duties and responsibilities?

Under <u>section 7 of the 1996 Education Act</u> it is the parents' duty; 'to cause the child to receive efficient full-time education suitable to their age, ability and aptitude and to any special educational needs they may have either by regular attendance at school or otherwise'.

If you choose to electively home educate your child, you will be responsible for arranging the most appropriate curriculum for them and meeting the full cost of their education.

What is meant by efficient and suitable education?

Education is considered efficient and suitable when it enables children to achieve their full potential. This means that it must be ageappropriate, enable the child to make progress according to their level of ability and take account of their interests.

How many hours of teaching a week should my child receive when electively home educated?

Typical school hours are:

Reception / Key Stage 1	21 hours
Key Stage 2	23.5 hours
Key Stage 3	24 hours
Key Stage 4	24 hours

However, there is no legal definition of "full-time" in terms of education at home. In elective home education there is often almost continuous oneto-one contact and education may sometimes take place outside of normal school hours.

How will I teach my child?

There are many styles of education with no method being better than another. You must choose the one that is best for your child.

You might decide to educate your child yourself or plan and teach in small groups with other home educators. Alternatively, you might decide to employ a private tutor or use an online provider.

Irrespective of who teaches your child or how, it is your parental responsibility to ensure that the learning programme is helping your child to make progress.

Do I have to follow the national curriculum?

You do not have to follow the <u>national</u> <u>curriculum</u> however you may find it helpful as a framework of what your child should be achieving to keep in line with their peers.

If you intend to send your child to school in the future, referring to the national curriculum would mean they are less likely to be disadvantaged when they return. There are many resources based on the national curriculum and some useful links are available at the end of this document.

The local authority recognises that there are different approaches to educational provision. If you electively home educate your child, our interest is in establishing that your child is being suitably educated.

What will it cost?

There are no funds available for parents that decide to electively home educate their child. You can expect to incur cost for:

Books

- Resources
- •Educational Study Visits
- •Physical Exercise
- •Examination Fees
- •Tutors or Online Learning Courses
- •Work Experience
- •College Placement for Under 16s (if available)

Your child will no longer receive free school meals if they currently have these.

Will my child miss the social aspect of school?

You may want to consider the social development of your child whilst they are educated at home. Joining a variety of clubs and interest groups can aid their social interaction with peers and support their mental well-being.

What should I do if my child has an Education and Health Care Plan?

The same procedure described above applies if your child has an Education and Health Care Plan and attends a mainstream school. However, if your child attends a special school, the consent of the local authority must be sought before the decision to electively home educate can be finalised. This is to ensure your child's specific needs can be met at home and ensure continuity of education.

For the duration of the Education, Health and Care Plan, the local authority will continue to hold an annual review to ensure the plan continues to be appropriate and effective. The right of appeal to a special educational needs tribunal still applies.

How do I withdraw my child from school?

You are required to write to the headteacher at your child's school informing that you intend to electively home educate your child. The school may reply to arrange a meeting to discuss how your child's needs could be met at school and the implications of choosing to electively home educate your child. Medway has 10-school days cooling off period from the school receiving the letter. Following this period, if you still wish to electively home educate your child, the school will remove your child from the register and notify the local authority.

If your child has never attended school, no notification is required but if you would like support, please contact the Elective Home Education Officer.

What Happens Next? Will the Local Authority be involved if my child is educated at home?

We like to get to know our home educating families and offer advice and guidance to you. You may be asked to complete an education provision review or send in examples of your child's work as part of the monitoring process.

The Elective Home Education Officer provides advice on education. They will contact you to ask for up-to-date information on how your child's education is progressing. If you would like a home visit or require more frequent support, please contact our team.

What will happen if suitable home education is not being provided?

Under section 437(1) of the Education Act 1996 the local authority has a duty to intervene if it appears that parents are not providing a suitable education.

Where there are concerns about a child's education, recommendations will made to support the child's progress and engagement with learning. These will need to be met within a mutually agreed timescale. If the recommendations are not met, the local authority has a duty to notify the Education Courts Officer who may take further action such as seeking a School Attendance Order.

Can my child return to school?

Yes. If you wish for your child to return to school, please contact Home Education Team. Please be aware that your child is likely to be offered a place back at the school they were withdrawn from if there are spaces.

Helpful Questions to Consider

- Is your child positive about the suggestion of home education?
- Are you convinced it is the best course of action for your child?
- Do you have the time to devote to your child's education on a regular basis?
- Do you have the necessary expertise to teach your child effectively?
- Will be able to educate your child to the required level if they wish to take GCSE examinations?
- Are you prepared to buy the necessary resources, if you do not already have access to them.
- Do you have some support available?
- Do you have the space to create a quiet working area and somewhere to store the resources you will use.
- Are there opportunities for physical exercise?
- Will social experiences with other children be available?
- Are you choosing to electively home educate because you are dissatisfied with the school?
